



Cherry Avenue Widening Construction Begins

The City completed the widening of Cherry Avenue within the Signal Hill city limits (Spring Street to 19th Street) in the late 1980's. However, the segment of Cherry Avenue between 19th Street and Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) which is located in the City of Long Beach remains substandard in width. The situation creates a bottleneck causing traffic to back up beyond 20th Street at times during rush hour periods.

The City will begin the 6.7 million Cherry Avenue Widening Project in mid January 2015 and it is expected to be completed by the end of May. During construction, lanes on Cherry Avenue will be reduced to one lane in each direction from Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) to 19th Street on a 24-hour basis. During construction, the City is recommending alternative routes. Specifically, the use of


Signal Hill's Water Conservation Efforts

How are we doing?

In response to one of the most severe droughts on record, the Signal Hill City Council declared a Level 1 Water Shortage Condition on May 21, 2014. This emergency condition imposes restrictions on water use and requires a 10% reduction in overall water usage.

After six months, how is the community doing? A review of water production data for the period May 1, 2014 through October 31, 2014 shows that the community has embraced water conservation. In June, residents cut back water usage by 4.9% when compared to the previous June. Water usage continued to decrease during the next five months and finally achieved the targeted savings of 10% in October 2014.

The table above shows water usage converted to Gallons per Person per Day (GPPPD). Notice that for October 2013 (light blue), the per person usage per day was 193 gallons. In October 2014 (dark blue),



the per day usage dropped to 174 gallons per day.

Even though the community has had a few storms recently, the total rainfall through January 1, 2015 is 4.04 inches. This is only 27% of what the community would

normally receive. Signal Hill is still considerably below its historical rainfall average of 14.45 inches. The outlook for the drought ending continues to be bleak. The challenge is to maintain the 10 percent reduction by continuing to practice good water conservation. ■

Five-Year Strategic Plan Update

Efforts to obtain public input from the community for the new Five-Year Strategic plan are complete. In 2014, three community meetings were held to provide the public with an opportunity to contribute their thoughts and suggestions for the new strategic plan. In total, approximately 75 residents and local businesses participated in the meetings. The plan will present the goals and objectives for the upcoming five-year period as well as the implementation strategy. The draft plan will be presented to the City Council for their consideration this spring. ■

Community Services – Volunteer Recognition

Every year, the City of Signal Hill offers a variety of programs and events to enrich the lives of residents in the community. In 2014, more than 2,000 people attended Spring Fest in April and the Halloween Carnival in October. The Signal Hill Public Library served more than 900 children through the weekly story time activities, summer reading program and teen reading club. Over six weeks in July and August, more than 3,000 people enjoyed the free concerts series in the park.

These programs and activities build a sense of belonging and a sense of pride in our community. From the library, to the parks, to the playgrounds, to the amphitheater, City Staff make every effort to ensure that every resident of Signal Hill has an opportunity to enjoy the events. City staff alone could never produce all these activities without the help from community volunteers and sponsor organizations.

On November 20, 2014, the City held a recognition dinner for the many volunteers who contribute to the success of community events. While there are many volunteers who assist in various ways, three individuals and two organizations stood out this year for their commitment and dedication to the City.

Youth Volunteers of the Year

This year the City was honored to have two very important youth volunteers who

generously gave their time to special events and the Signal Hill Public Library.



Alex Honeycutt has been volunteering for the City the past several years at City-wide special events including

the Halloween Carnival, Cookies with Santa, and Spring Fest. This young man has always been willing to do whatever is asked of him and does so eagerly and with pride.

Our community has beautiful neighborhoods and attractive businesses with residents and business owners who care about our planet's precious resources. The City of Signal Hill has two recognition programs and we'd like to highlight the recent award winners in our community.



The Sustainable City Committee's **Sustainability Award** recognizes those who employ sustainable practices and have a positive environmental mentality. In October, Mayor Wilson presented the award to the Seeds of Change Environmental Club from the Jessie Elwin Nelson Academy. The Club has made a positive impact on the school campus, the community and environment. The Garden Club has transformed marginal grounds into fruitful and flower-filled gardens. The Club members daily sort cafeteria waste for composting, recycling, and garbage bins; utilize food waste

and shredded paper for composting; collect uneaten food for donation; recycle bottles and cans; and model healthy eating habits.

The **Beautification Award**, recognizing those who make improvements to their property and enhance the neighborhood, was presented at the Planning Commission in September to the



Willow Ridge Community Association (HOA). Over the last several years, the HOA has repaired or replaced all wood and wrought iron; refurbished the pool, spa, decking and tennis courts; updated exterior lighting; and installed a drip irrigation system, decorative rocks and drought friendly plants. The HOA is planning to strategically reduce grass areas while maintaining the overall park atmosphere by removing approximately 3,100 square feet of grass and installing mulch and shrubs.

In December, an award was also presented to a Hilltop neighborhood



homeowner for construction of a retaining wall, which serves as a foundation for a 50 foot water feature. The retaining wall showcases flower beds planted with ornamental grasses, which have also been planted in the parkway.

CD Update



The final building at the Signal Hill Gateway Center was constructed on Spring Street between Atlantic and California Avenues. The development includes an outdoor dining area for patrons to enjoy the views and has a drive-thru for Starbucks customers. Chipotle, Starbucks, Sprint, and a Bank of America ATM kiosk are now open for business. ■



OTHER SERVICES

Animal Control

The City of Signal Hill contracts with the City of Long Beach Animal Control for animal services. All dogs, four months old and older, are required to have a current dog license pursuant to local municipal codes (Signal Hill SHMC 6.08.010). A permanent dog license tag is issued when a license is first purchased (there is a \$5 fee for replacement tags). To purchase a dog license, the owner may come to the Community Services Department at City Hall with the current rabies inoculation certificate (must be good for the entire licensing period), and a certificate of sterility if the dog has been spayed or neutered. The fees are \$95 unaltered, \$20 altered, and \$25 late fee. Seniors (age 60+) have a discounted rate of \$10. This discount is for one altered dog per household only; all others are at regular rates.
