

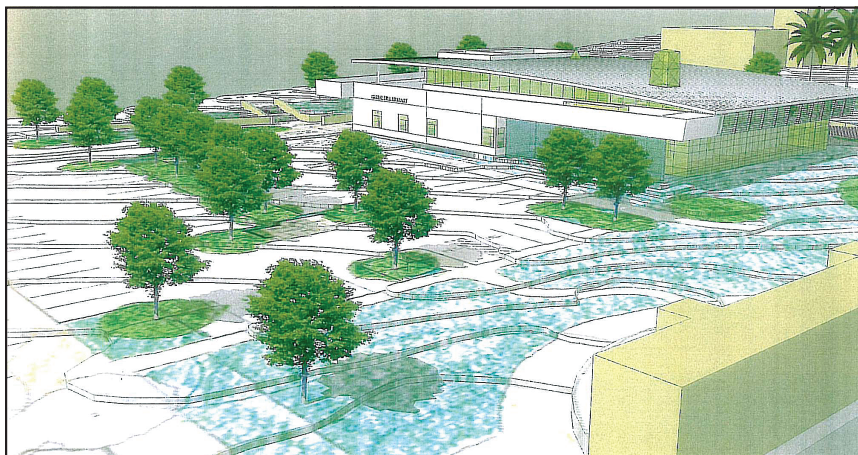

New Signal Hill Library!



To make way for construction of the new Signal Hill Public Library, the doors on the now former library building officially closed on April 30th. The library will temporarily operate in the Signal Hill Park Community Center until the new library is opened. Architectural plans for the new library are being completed and construction is expected to begin in early 2017. The anticipated opening date for the new library is March 2018. Demolition of the existing library building will take place later this summer.

The new library will be approximately 12,000 square feet in size, nearly triple the size of the former library building that was originally the Signal Hill Fire Station built in 1931. Features will include separate areas for children, teens, adults and seniors as well as state-of-the-art technology to keep pace with the changing trends in library use. An outdoor patio will

provide a garden setting for reading, socializing, and receptions. A special feature of the library is the History Room that will display items of interest related to Signal Hill history.

The Community Services Department administrative offices, currently located on the top floor of City Hall,

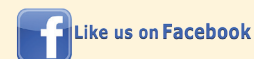
will be relocated to the Library to provide the community with improved access to parks and recreation programs. A larger parking lot will also be constructed to better serve the library, Signal Hill Park and the Community and Youth Center.

Temporary Library Location

The library will be temporarily relocated to the Signal Hill Park Community Center located at 1780 E. Hill Street, which is located behind the old library building. Library hours will remain the same and the library will offer a large collection of books magazines and DVDs. Four public computers will be available as well as a children's area and places to sit and study.

Community Resilience in Signal Hill

A major earthquake collapses segments of the 405 Freeway isolating hundreds of Signal Hill residents from the main body of their city; a prolonged drought reduces public water supplies to local residents and requires government intervention to provide emergency water sources; an outbreak of disease rises to epidemic levels in the region and public health officials begin mass vaccination points of distribution in the city. These hazards, and many others lurking just below the radar, will stress our city's emergency services providers, and will require active, trained volunteers as well as trained and prepared citizens to assist professional first responders in providing service and recovery assistance to our citizens.

It is in these areas that Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) can provide the extra staffing and trained assistance that will help our citizens respond to, and recover from disasters within the city and in our region.

The Signal Hill CERT met recently for its first quarter training and drill session at the Signal Hill Emergency Operations Center. Team members reviewed the skills they learned in their initial L.A. County Fire Department training in 2015 and practiced applying those skills in primary patient triage, victim rescue, and head-to-toe patient assessment in real time rescue scenarios. The commitment of time and energy these community volunteers exhibit is truly impressive. The initial training for the team covers 3 Saturdays from 8:00 AM to 5:00 PM. The team also meets quarterly in 4 or 5 hour blocks for skill refreshers and new skill

training. Signal Hill CERT will be holding a full CERT training course in August 2016. Residents who want to go through the course should contact Richard Johnson at (562) 985-7239 to learn more about the training and to secure a seat.

If this amount of time is more than you have available, Signal Hill has a neighborhood focused program available called Map Your Neighborhood. This program is designed to be delivered to residents by residents. Program materials are distributed to interested residents at the Signal Hill Community Services Dept. A resident will sign up to receive a brief facilitator training by the Signal Hill Emergency Operations Coordinator. Once that training is completed, the facilitator contacts the neighbors in the immediate neighborhood, they meet at the facilitator's home and get a 90 minute program on how to prepare for, respond to, and recover from a disaster. This program is used in surrounding Los Angeles County communities and has been customized for the city of Signal Hill.



Either of these emergency preparedness programs can provide you with the skills and knowledge to prepare your home or business to respond and recover from natural or man-made disaster. The more residents that can be trained in response skills and knowledge, the more resilient our city will become and be better able to recover quickly from the effects of disaster. Take steps now to make your home and family response ready and disaster resilient. ■

Mayor's Clean-Up News



Thank you to the many volunteers who participated in the Mayor's Clean-Up event on March 12th, 2016 with a base camp at the Fresh & Easy parking lot. Approximately 50 volunteers walked the streets and gave a helping hand with the clean-up of the Crescent Heights Historic District. Mayor's clean-up events are generally held several times a year and rotate to different areas of the city.

The Crescent Heights Historic District was established in 2002 and is located between Walnut and Cherry Avenues and Crescent Heights Street and Creston Streets. It is envisioned as an enclave of turn-of-the-century homes in a historically styled neighborhood, featuring unique architectural styles from the period

of 1890-1930 such as the Craftsman Bungalow. Currently, there are seven historic homes in the neighborhood with the remainder being vacant land.

Attending volunteers included members of the Sustainable City Committee; the Signal Hill Rotary and its youth organization; Interact Club; the Cub Scouts; and the Long Beach Islamic Center. Additionally, it was nice to see quite a few Signal Hill residents and business owners spend the morning helping out.

Special thanks to Signal Hill Disposal for providing a trash dumpster and Signal Hill Petroleum, Inc. for lending the Fresh & Easy site as a basecamp for the event.

Trash picked up at the event was sent to a material recovery facility where the materials were sorted for recycling. The volunteers did an amazing job filling one trash dumpster with approximately 400 pounds of trash.

Did you know?

There are three new types of invasive mosquitoes in Southern California: Asian tiger mosquito, yellow fever mosquito, and the Australian backyard mosquito. These mosquitoes are about 1/4 of the size of a quarter and are black with white stripes.

The mosquitoes are different because they can transmit diseases such as dengue, yellow fever, zika virus, and chikungunya virus. These mosquitoes are unique because they bite during the day and thrive indoors and in urban environments. They may lay their eggs in stagnant water sources as small as a bottle cap!

Residents should report black and white daytime-biting mosquitoes to the Greater Los Angeles County Vector Control District at (562) 944-9656 or www.ReportMosquitoes.org. Stay mosquito free by drilling holes in the bottom of all plant pots, saucers, barrels, bins, and remove old tires. Do not keep water in buckets or root plant cuttings in water. Sharing plant cuttings can spread mosquito eggs. Cover trash cans, toys and recycling bins. Wear insect repellent containing DEET, Picaridin, IR 3535 or oil of lemon eucalyptus. ■

The State of California is in its 5th year of a drought. Even with the rain and snowfall over the past year, Southern California continues to experience a drought. Governor Brown issued an executive order on May 9th, making permanent certain temporary water restrictions such as hosing off sidewalks, driveways, and other hardscapes. The State Water Board will permanently prohibit washing automobiles with hoses not equipped with a shut-off nozzle and watering lawns in a manner that causes runoff. The Signal Hill City Council declared a Level 2 water shortage. The City of Signal Hill will continue its current watering schedule. Watering of landscaping is allowed on Tuesday and Saturday before 9 am and after 4 pm. Here are other ways residents can save water:

- Choose a water efficient irrigation system such as drip irrigation for your trees, shrubs – Save 15 gallons / each time you water.
- Plant drought resistant trees and plants – Save 30-60 gallons / each time your water.
- Use a broom to clean driveways, sidewalks, and patios – Save 8 to 18 gallons per minute.
- Install an aerator on your kitchen faucet to reduce flows to less than 1 gallon per minute.
- Install a low-flow showerhead – Save 2.5 gallons.

Get your free water conservation kit at City Hall which includes: an aerator for your faucet, a shower timer, and a colored tablet which will help you check your toilet for leaks.

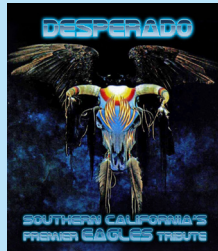

Sustainability Awards from the Signal Hill City Council



At the City Council meeting held on Tuesday, February 23, 2016, Mayor Larry Forester presented the Sustainability Award in the category of Water Efficient Landscapes to the owner of 1843 Junipero Avenue. Daritza Gonzalez accepted the award on behalf of her father, Manuel Gonzalez. The Sustainable City Committee selected this residence for the 1st quarter Sustainability Award.



Mr. Gonzalez brought changes to the Southeast neighborhood in Signal Hill when he began to improve his front yard about three years ago by replacing turf with sand, decorative rocks, cactus and other drought tolerant plant material to create a one-of-a-kind desert-like landscape. The plants are hand watered and Mr. Gonzalez stated that his water bill has been reduced by half since the replacement of turf.



The Sustainable City Committee Also Selected Two Other Properties



A Molino Avenue resident in the Southeast neighborhood replaced bushes and shrubs with drought tolerant plant materials and stepping stones.



An Orange Avenue resident in the Northend neighborhood replaced the turf in the parkway with mulch and drought tolerant plants. ■

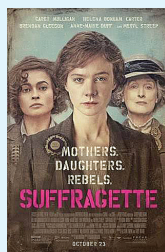

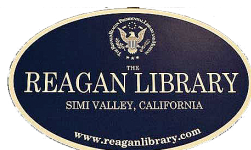

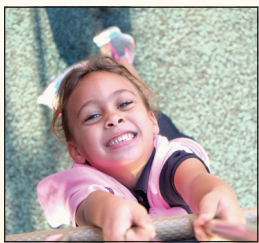
