Updates:

Reservoir Park Playground

A Ribbon Cutting Ceremony at Reservoir Park has been scheduled for Saturday, February 4 from 11am – 1pm. A light lunch and craft will be given out to the event attendees. Signal Hill Police Department will have a police cruiser on site for children to look at and enjoy.

Community Recreation Needs Assessment

Staff are working with consultants, Richard Fisher Associates, to conduct a Community Recreation Needs Assessment to prioritize the parks, recreation and library services needs of the community for the next five to ten years. The final draft of the Needs Assessment is expected to be completed by June 2017. In December, consultants met with key city staff to receive their feedback regarding the recreation and library services

programs. A Community Meeting has been scheduled for Wednesday, February 8, 2017 from 5:30-7:30pm at the Signal Hill Library. Signal Hill residents will be receiving a postcard flyer to inform them of the meeting.

Recreation Division

Signal Hill Afterschool Recreation Club (ARC)

The afterschool program was scheduled through December 13, the last day of school before winter break. The ARC program students spent their last few days of school preparing for a winter performance for their peers and parents. Each group sang one to two holiday songs and enjoyed a hot chocolate after the performance. There was over 70 parents in attendance. Besides practicing for their performance, the last few days of school were celebrated by making winter crafts and holiday decorations, learning about and completing random acts of kindness and creating cards for loved ones.

Winter Day Camp

Winter Day camp was scheduled from December 14 – January 6, with one week break from December 26-30. Each week focused on a different theme and activities were based around that theme. The first week of camp's activities included creating tie dye shirts, making play dough and silly putty, and making homemade ice cream. The second week of camp focused on interesting and obscure holidays that are on the calendar. One obscure holiday was the National Snowflake Day where children learned about snowflakes. The theme for the third week was focused around pixelated and video games. Participants played a real life version of Candy Crush and Skee Ball, made Lego friendship bracelets and Angry Birds. There were two excursions during the two and a half weeks of camp, one was to the California Science Center and the second trip was to the Nickel Nickel arcade.

Tweens

The Tweens spent the month of December working on “Do it yourself” projects. They made marbleized mugs, duct tape pens, snow globes and chore coupon books for their parents. They also took a field trip to see the Disney movie *Moana*. Another “Do It Yourself” project they worked on was art on canvas which were displayed during the ARC Winter Performance at the Youth Center. The Tween program finished off the year by preparing to be Junior Recreation Leaders at Winter Camp during the first week of January.

Youth Sports

The month of December was spent training coaches and preparing teams for the upcoming basketball season. Practices began on January 6 and games will begin on January 28. The basketball season will run until the beginning of March.

Community Services Division

Senior Bingo Club

For the month of December, the Signal Hill Social Club (also known as Bingo Group) took place in conjunction with the annual Senior Luncheon on December 8. 47 Active Adults took part in Bingo which was held at the Alpert Jewish Community Center.

Active Adult Excursions

In December, the department offered one excursion. On Tuesday, December 20, 46 program participants traveled to Riverside to take part in the Festival of Lights at the historic Mission Inn Hotel and Spa. Participants also enjoyed dinner at the Old Spaghetti Factory.

Food Distribution Program

Food Distribution occurs every two weeks. For December, a total of 56 participants received food with an average of 28 distributed on each day. There are 30 low-income senior residents enrolled in the program and applications are now being accepted for additional participants.

Discounted Bus Passes

In December, six reduced-fare bus passes were purchased by low-income and disabled residents. Applications are now being accepted for additional participants.

Dial-a-Taxi

In December, three out of five members used this service.

Volunteer Hours

In December, the 7 volunteers attended the Senior Folding Group event to fold the January Active Adult Newsletter. The newsletters were mailed out to 200 Active Adults.

Community Garden

The Community Garden currently has 24 out of 24 plots reserved.

Tree Lighting Ceremony

On Thursday, December 1, the City gathered for the Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony at Discovery Well Park. Guests took pictures with Santa Claus and enjoyed live holiday music before the official tree lighting. Guests were treated to cookies donated by Rossmoor bakery along with hot chocolate, coffee and hot apple cider after the tree was illuminated.

Senior Luncheon

On Thursday, December 8, The Community Services Department hosted its annual Senior Luncheon. The luncheon began with the game of Bingo. Participants played Bingo for various prizes for an hour while also being treated to refreshments. Lunch included turkey, stuffing, green beans, mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce and fresh rolls was provided by Blueberry Hill Catering. Hot and Cold refreshments and desserts were also available. Guests were also given a raffle ticket to enter drawings for prizes. Supervisor Don Knabe donated large pumpkin pies for each guest to take home at the end of the event.

Cookies with Santa

On Saturday, December 10, the Community Services Department hosted its Annual Cookies with Santa event. The event was held at the Library and hosted 80 children and adults. Ms. Claus started the night off with a few songs and a story. Shortly after, Santa Claus joined the festivities and read another story. Once the stories were over, attendees

had the opportunity to take pictures with Santa, make a holiday craft, and enjoy complimentary cookies donated by Rossmoor bakery.

In December, facility rentals generated \$822.00 in revenue with 12 facility rentals.


Signal Hill Public Library


Circulation

Story Time Programs

A total of 114 children and 85 adults attended a total of 8 regularly scheduled story times. Average attendance for each story time was 24. The library offers two story times: Baby & Toddler Storytime on Tuesdays at 10:00 am, and Preschool Storytime on Thursdays at 10:00 am.

First Friday Book Club

The December First Friday Book Club discussion was held at Discovery Well Park on December 2 and hosted 14 adult participants. The book discussed was *One Summer: 1927* by Bill Bryson

Teen Drop-In Program

The Teen Drop-in program was held on December 1 and December 8 with 8 total attendees; averaging 4 attendees per program. The programs featured showing the movie *A Charlie Brown Christmas* and making hot chocolate.

Tween After School Club

The Tween After School Club met on December 6 and December 27 with a total of 8 attendees averaging 4 attendees per session. The programs were making Snow Globes and Wizard Wands.

Special Programs

Movie Night was held on December 8. The movie shown was *A Tree Grows in Brooklyn*. There were 8 attendees.

Crafter Day Afternoon

The December Crafter Day Afternoon was held on December 17. The craft was stained glass candle jars. There were 3 attendees.
