

HELP SHAPE THE NEXT TEN YEARS OF PARKS AND RECREATION

Community Services is in the process of planning an update of the Parks & Recreation Master Plan that will outline and direct the next decade of City recreation and community services programs. The plan is based on last year's Community Recreation Needs Assessment, and focuses on City parks, facilities and trails. Be on the lookout for upcoming opportunities to get involved! These will include a Parks and Recreation Commission study session, community outreach meetings, and online surveys. The previous Master Plan, completed in 1989, enabled the realization of Hilltop Park, Discovery Well Park, the Dog Park and the Community Garden. ■

ORGANIC RECYCLING: SAVING NATURAL RESOURCES



We all want to do our part for the environment, and organic recycling is an easy way to reduce waste. Recyclable organic waste is any material that is biodegradable and comes from either a plant or an animal. Examples include green waste, food waste, food-soiled paper, non-hazardous wood waste, and landscape and pruning waste. When organic waste is dumped in landfills, it decomposes and produces methane, a greenhouse gas that is 20 times more potent than carbon dioxide. Organic recycling reduces these harmful emissions while conserving our natural resources.

Organic recycling is required by state law for some businesses and multi-family dwellings. AB 1826 mandates businesses that produce food or green waste to arrange for organic recycling services. Multi-family dwellings are required to recycle green waste only. Contact EDCO at 562-597-0608 to arrange for organic recycling services.

Everyone can help reduce organic waste. Lower your household's food waste by purchasing only what you need at the grocery store. Shopping for food more frequently will help you buy less. Get the whole family involved in organic recycling by starting a compost pile in your backyard. Learn more by visiting <https://www.calrecycle.ca.gov>.

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH: SPOTLIGHT ON JESSIE NELSON

March is Women's History Month, and the City celebrates Jessie Nelson, Signal Hill's first mayor.

Nelson's influence was key to the establishment of Signal Hill as its own city. When oil was first discovered on Signal Hill in the early 1920s, she fought to keep it from annexation by the City of Long Beach. She then led the movement to incorporate Signal Hill as a city. In 1924, Nelson became Signal Hill's first mayor, and one of California's first female mayors.

Jessie Elwin Nelson Middle School and Jessie Nelson Circle in Signal Hill are just a few reminders of her contributions to the City's history. ■




