Happy 95th Birthday, Signal Hill!

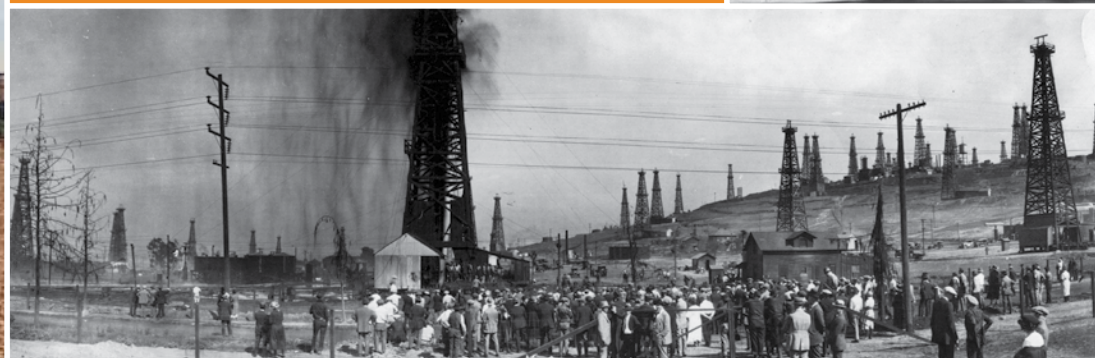


The City of Signal Hill celebrated its 95th birthday on April 18. With ten beautiful parks, a diverse economy, and a brand-new Public Library on the horizon, we look forward to the next 95 years in Signal Hill.



MOMENTS IN SIGNAL HILL HISTORY

- 1500's – Spanish explorers arrive in the area of Signal Hill/Long Beach
- Early 1840's – American explorers purchase two ranchos that were on what is now Signal Hill
- Late 1800's – Farmers and residences establish themselves on the hilltop
- 1916 – Union Oil drills the first oil well on Signal Hill
- 1921 – the Royal Dutch Shell Oil Company's Alamitos No. 1 well hits Signal Hill's first oil gusher
- 1921 – 1924 – Oil companies flock to Signal Hill, starting a "black gold rush"
- 1924 – Signal Hill is officially incorporated on April 18, days later, Jessie Elwin Nelson is elected as Signal Hill's first mayor
- 1934 – Signal Hill's current City Hall building is completed at Hill Street and Cherry Avenue
- 1958 – The Hancock Oil Refinery Fire ignites and burns for two days
- 1978 – The original Signal Hill Fire Station is converted into the Signal Hill Public Library
- 2000 – Hilltop Park opens
- 2002 – Signal Hill gets its own zip code, 90755
- 2003 – Panorama Promenade Trail and Discovery Well Park open
- 2006 – City dedicates "Tribute to the Roughnecks" statue
- 2013 – Signal Hill's new Police Station opens
- 2018 – Signal Hill's first Dog Park opens
- 2019 – Signal Hill's new Public Library will open



SIGNAL HILL PUBLIC LIBRARY

Construction on Signal Hill's Public Library is reaching the home stretch! Crews are hard at work both outside and inside, giving this state-of-the-art facility its final touches. Over the last few months the building became fully sealed, and workers are installing electrical, plumbing, and other utility infrastructures inside. Walls are being painted, doors and windows are being installed, and crews are laying down the flooring. On the outside, work is underway on the parking lot, landscaping, and exterior lighting.

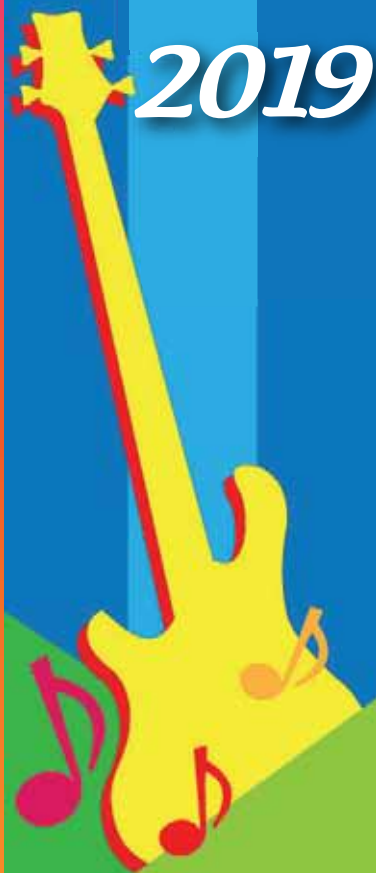

Congratulations to Larry Forester, recipient of Signal Hill's 2019 Outstanding Older American Award. Larry recently retired from a long and distinguished career in civil service, beginning in 1997 when he joined the Signal Hill Planning Commission. Larry was elected to Signal Hill City Council in 1998, and served as a City Council member for the next 21 years including four terms as Mayor. Larry's vision and leadership helped transform Signal Hill into a vibrant and diverse community. Larry was part of several major projects including the Los Cerritos Channel Storm Water Capture Project, the new Police Station and Library, the creation of the City's first Dog Park, the widening of Cherry Avenue, and the establishment of the Well 9 Groundwater Pump and Treatment System. The City of Signal Hill is grateful for Larry's exceptional service and his accomplishments that have improved the quality of life in Signal Hill for years to come.

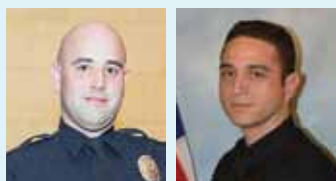
SHPD OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES HONORED AT 4TH ANNUAL POLICE AWARDS DINNER

REQUIRED RECYCLING FOR BUSINESSES AND MULTI-FAMILY DWELLINGS

AB 341

Effective January 1, AB 341 requires commercial businesses and multi-family dwellings with five or more units that generate four cubic yards or more of trash per week to have a recycling program in place.

AB 1826

Additionally, AB 1826 requires those same businesses and multi-family dwellings that generate four cubic yards or more of organic waste per week to implement an organic recycling program. Organic waste includes unused food and food scraps, food-soiled paper/cardboard, and landscape debris. Composting is one way to recycle these organic waste items.

These state laws are aimed at fighting climate change by keeping certain types of solid waste out of landfills, where it generates greenhouse gases and harms the environment.

RECYCLING 101

Residents and families: here's what you need to know about recycling these everyday household items in Signal Hill.



GLASS BOTTLES & JARS

Clear and colored glass is accepted. Please rinse out before recycling. No need to remove labels.



CANS

Please recycle aluminum cans and steel cans. Aluminum foil is accepted. Paint cans, too, as long as they are clean and dry with no leftover paint inside.



PLASTIC CONTAINERS

Recycle all rigid plastics, such as bottles, jugs, and jars, marked 1 to 7, and all beverage containers labeled "CA Redemption Value" or "CA Cash Refund". All containers must be empty.

- Food & Beverage Containers - do not require rinsing before recycling as long as they are empty and free of food and liquids.
- Plastic Jars & Canisters
- Cleaning Products & Detergents
- Automotive & Yard Care Products
- Miscellaneous Rigid Plastics — Includes plastic buckets with metal handles, plastic drums, plastic milk crates, laundry baskets, lawn furniture, and pet carriers, plastic toys, plastic agricultural trays/pots, plastic pallets, and other mixed plastic containers. Items must be clean.



MIXED PAPER

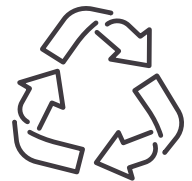
- You can recycle virtually all clean and dry paper including: writing paper (all colors), computer paper, Xerox paper, "no carbon required" (NCR) forms, catalogs, brochures, magazines, junk mail, phone books, etc.
- If items have staples, window envelopes, or small metal clasps, no need to remove them. No large metal items like large paper prong fasteners or 3-ring binders.
- Shredded paper is accepted as long as shreds are placed in paper bags.
- You can recycle cereal boxes and other clean paper food packaging, including cake boxes, flour bags, frozen dinner boxes, paper egg cartons, and 12-pack beverage carrying boxes.
- Paper grocery bags, gift boxes, shoe boxes, paper gift wrap, calendars, and core tubes from paper towels, etc. are accepted.
- Do NOT recycle paper coffee cups and plates, napkins or paper towels.

CARDBOARD

- Should be clean and dry. Flatten or cut boxes to a size that fits comfortably inside recycling cart.
- Pizza boxes are accepted if they are free of grease and food stains. Boxes with grease residue, cheese, etc. should NOT be recycled.

NEWSPAPERS

- You can recycle your entire newspaper and everything that is delivered with it—including inserts, coupons, etc.



HAZARDOUS WASTE: DON'T THROW IT IN THE BIN!

Specific hazardous household waste items like batteries, unused paint, motor oil/filters, personal sharps, and chemicals should NOT go into your trash or recycling bin. Instead, they should be recycled at EDCO's Recycling Center at 2755 California Avenue, Signal Hill. The center accepts hazardous items at no charge on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month, from 9 a.m. - 2 p.m. Contact EDCO at 562-597-0608 or visit their website for a full list of items considered hazardous.
