
COVID-19 VARIANTS, VACCINES AND STAYING SAFE

OMICRON VARIANT



The Omicron variant is highly transmissible. This new version of COVID-19 requires everyone to be vigilant, regardless of vaccination status. Wearing a high-quality

and well-fitted mask, getting tested, getting vaccinated, and getting a booster dose on top of the initial vaccination series are the best ways to protect yourself from severe illness and hospitalization.

VACCINES

If you've been fully vaccinated but have yet to get your booster shot, please do so as soon as you are eligible. Booster doses provide an extra layer of protection from severe illness and hospitalization. They can even reduce transmissibility of the virus. Everyone 12 and older should



receive a booster dose when they are eligible. Even those who have recovered from COVID-19 should get vaccinated and boosted for strong protection against re-infection.

If I've been fully vaccinated, why do I need a booster dose?

When getting a vaccine to protect against a disease like COVID-19, boosters can be a normal part of the vaccination process. With the original dose, the immune system is taught to recognize and produce antibodies against the virus it was created to defend. This immunity can decrease over time, like with many other vaccines. Booster doses help remind the immune system about the virus it needs to defend against. Variants of the virus can learn to evade the immune system, and booster doses help to "retrain" your body's defenses for a new threat.




MASKING

HERITAGE POINT PARK UPDATE




After several years of planning, we are looking forward to the grand opening of Signal Hill's newest park later this spring! Heritage Point Park is located at the corner of E. Burnett Street and Cherry Avenue. The park will provide a link to the City's existing trail system by connecting pedestrians from the Hilltop trails down towards the Civic Center. The park will include multiple seating areas for view opportunities, a landscaped trail for pedestrian access, and vehicular access for adjacent oil well operators. In the future, it will also feature a historical element to celebrate important people, places, and events in Signal Hill history. SIGNAL HILL BUSINESS PARK – COMING SOON

A new light industrial business park is coming to Signal Hill, with construction scheduled to begin this spring. The 8.69-acre Signal Hill Business Park will be located on the east and west sides of Walnut Avenue at E. 21st Street. Gundry Avenue borders the site on the west and Gaviota Avenue borders the site on the east.

The business park is comprised of nine buildings which will house various businesses engaged in a variety of light industrial activities, providing jobs for local residents and an added economic base for the City. We look forward to the completion of this exciting project!





SB 9: IMPACTS TO CC&RS AND HOAS

Senate Bill 9 took effect on January 1, 2022. This new law requires the City to treat any proposed housing development containing “no more than 2 residential units” as “single-family residential housing.” This allows a homeowner to split their lot and then use existing law to build an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) on each of the two new lots, up to a total of four units. The City must ministerially approve lot splits in accordance with SB 9. However, HOAs have the option to prohibit these splits if they do so via their CC&Rs. HOAs may consider, individually and through their own boards of directors and counsel, whether and how to lawfully adopt a rule or bylaw prohibiting lot splits. However, the City cannot deny a lot split application based on the CC&Rs alone. SB 9 also exempts historic zones and properties from lot split development. HOUSING ELEMENT 2021-2029 UPDATE



The City continues to support the production of affordable housing for everyone in the community with the adoption of its 6th Cycle Housing Element. We'd like to thank all the residents who helped shape the City's Housing Element over the past year by attending a workshop, providing public comment, or by taking our Housing Element survey.

Future Housing Sites to Meet the 6th Cycle RHNA

California law requires that every eight years, all cities and counties update their Housing Element to address community-wide housing needs. During each eight-year cycle, the State

assigns cities and counties a specific number of housing units categorized by various income levels. This mandated number of units is called the Regional Housing Needs Assessment Allocation (RHNA). Signal Hill's RHNA is 517 units, three times as many as the previous cycle.

Four sites are currently being considered to help the City meet these housing goals.

How the Sites Were Selected:

In April 2021, the City kicked off public outreach by circulating the Community Survey for Housing Needs. We also shared an informational video during the summer of 2021 and continued to engage the community through flyers, booths at City events, and information distributed through various digital and non-digital channels.

Based on community feedback, potential sites were identified. These sites were then analyzed and studied to identify development constraints. These sites were presented over the course of three Planning Commission workshops.

How You Can Participate:

During this next phase, the Draft Housing Element is available for review and comment from all stakeholders. You can find it posted on our website. We encourage you to review it and submit any comments which will be included in the final document. Next steps will include bringing the General Plan and Zoning Amendments for future development of these sites to the Planning Commission and to the City Council for final approval.



COMMEMORATIVE FLAGS IN 2022

Since 2019, the City has adopted a commemorative flag policy to allow for the rotating display of commemorative flags underneath the City flag at City Hall. City Council approved the following flags to be displayed throughout 2022.

In accordance with the commemorative flag schedule, the Signal Hill Public Library will host relevant cultural programming to further discussion, education, and engagement on each flag's theme. We invite local groups who are passionate about and engaged with any of these topics to collaborate with us to create relevant educational opportunities. Programming is at the discretion of the City. ANIMAL CARE SERVICES

The City of Signal Hill contracts with the City of Long Beach Animal Care for services. All dogs, four months old and older, are required to have a current dog license by local municipal codes (Signal Hill SHMC 6.08.010). A permanent dog license tag is issued when a license is first purchased (there is a \$5 fee for replacement tags). To purchase a dog license, the owner may come to Community Services Department at City Hall with the current rabies inoculation certificate (must be good for the entire licensing period), and a certificate of sterility if the dog has been spayed or neutered. The fees are \$95 unaltered, \$20 altered, and \$25 late fee. Seniors 60+ receive a discounted rate of \$10. This discount is for one altered dog per household only; all others are at regular rates.

CAN WE HELP YOU WITH TRANSPORTATION?

The Signal Hill subsidized transportation program is available by application to Signal Hill residents who are over the age of 62 or are 18 years and older and can provide a proof of disability signed by a licensed physician. The program offers a reduced fare monthly bus pass for Long Beach Transit buses or Dial-A-Taxi voucher books allowing subsidized use of the Yellow Cab service. Applications for these programs are available at the Community Services Department.

Dial-A-Lift Long Beach is a curb-to-curb, shared ride transit service exclusively for the mobility impaired residing in Signal Hill and traveling throughout the cities of Long Beach, Lakewood, and Signal Hill. Contact 562-989-7330 for all transportation questions.


