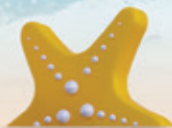
Summer Greetings

THROW GARBAGE IN ITS PLACE! ORGANICS GO IN THE GREEN CART

Did you know that organic waste accounts for more than 40% of California’s waste stream material? Organic material cannot break down when buried in a landfill, as it would in nature or a compost pile, because it decomposes without oxygen, releasing methane gas into the atmosphere. By recycling food waste, it can become compost, renewable energy, or fuel. When you use your green cart for your organic waste, you reduce waste at the landfill and CO2 emissions to preserve our environment!



All green waste, both yard and food, goes in the green waste cart provided to residents by EDCO. Food scraps include fruit, vegetables, meat, bones, eggshells, and prepared food like leftovers. Did you know food-soiled paper can go in the green waste cart, too? Throw used napkins, tea bags, paper plates, pizza boxes, and coffee filters into the green cart! At the April 11, 2023 City Council meeting Daritza Gonzalez was appointed City Clerk for a term ending December 2024. Daritza has been serving as a Civil Service Commissioner since June 1, 2019, and an active board member for the Signal Hill Community Foundation for several years. Congratulations, Daritza!

FIREWORKS ARE ILLEGAL IN SIGNAL HILL

Each year, fireworks cause numerous injuries, emotional distress, damage property, and frighten animals. The City imposes fines ranging from \$1,000 to \$80,000 for possessing, storing, selling, displaying or setting off fireworks in Signal Hill. Additionally, anyone who hosts a social gathering or other use of illegal fireworks on their property could be held responsible. A host is defined as a person in charge of a private property, including an owner, tenant, landlord or property manager, who “supervises, officiates, conducts, controls or is otherwise in charge of the activity on the property.” The host does not have to be present during the use of illegal fireworks to be cited. However, if a host immediately notifies the Signal Hill Police Department of illegal fireworks on their property, they will not be held responsible.

Individuals or hosts will be charged a fine of \$1,000 for a first-time offense involving less than 100 pounds of fireworks, plus \$250 for fireworks disposal, for a total of \$1,250. The fine and disposal amounts charged increase by the number of offenses per year and the weight of the fireworks involved. A third-time offense within one year for less than 100 pounds of fireworks will result in a \$3,000 fine plus a \$1,000 disposal fee.



Please remember that the City’s Municipal Code specifically prohibits sparklers, firecrackers, torpedoes, skyrockets, Roman candles, aerial bombs, and buzz bombs. The risk is not worth it – please help keep our community safe!

AB 1276 - SINGLE-USE FOODWARE

On October 5, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom signed into law AB 1276 which prohibits food facilities from providing single-use foodware and condiments without first being requested by a consumer.

On June 28, 2022, the Signal Hill City Council held a public hearing to introduce an ordinance adding Chapter 8.14 to the Signal Hill Municipal Code, relating to Single-Use Foodware Accessories and Condiments. On July 12, 2022, the ordinance was adopted.

INTERACTIVE PROJECT MAP

CITY PLANNING NEWS

FOCUSED GENERAL PLAN UPDATE: ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE AND ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES ELEMENTS

The City of Signal Hill is pursuing focused General Plan amendments consisting of preparing a new Environmental Justice Element and updating the Environmental Resources Element. These elements will provide policy direction to improve community health and the environment.



The Environmental Justice Element will be an entirely new element, and the seventh element of the Signal Hill General Plan. This element seeks to identify approaches to reduce multiple sources of pollution exposure that are disproportionately burdening geographic areas, focuses on improving citywide measures relating to healthy food access, and promotes civic engagement and transparency in the decision-making process.

The Environmental Resources Element, adopted in 1986, combines the open space and conservation elements into one document to address the long-term and comprehensive preservation and conservation of open space. It also details the conservation, development, and use of natural resources such as water, forests, soils, rivers, and mineral deposits. In 2021, the City Council approved the new 2021-2031 Parks and Recreation Master Plan (PRMP) calling for upgraded park facilities and new park spaces. The Master Plan documents the City's open space and recreation goals. The PRMP key goals and implementation measures will be folded into the Environmental Resources Element.

SPOTLIGHT ON SMALL BUSINESS: TEN MILE BREWING

Started in 2012 by the father and son duo Dan and Jesse Sundstrom, this family-run business has all the necessary street cred to take on many larger breweries. Humble and curious beginnings, they started in their kitchen making beer for personal consumption that turned into a passion that resulted in a business that has remained true to their principles: create a product that people love to drink; serve it in a peaceful and friendly community and enjoy it with family and friends close by.

The father and son duo realized they were on to something when their beers won awards, and their startup was recognized as a serious brewery. Having outgrown their kitchen, they searched for a space to follow their entrepreneurial drive. Since Dan was born in the City of Signal Hill, it seemed only natural that our City was chosen as the location for their first taproom. When asked what he liked best about our City, Jesse simply answered, "We love the small town feel mixed in with a chill vibe. The reception by this community, especially the City Council, the police department, and the people themselves, has been incredible. We're committed to investing our time, creating relationships and being part of this neighborhood for a long time."

Ten Mile Brewing is nearly 3,600 square feet of warm and inviting indoor space featuring handmade tables and a 23-foot-long bar made from a drought-fallen tree. As a bonus, they have a patio that is dog friendly! Their beer list has something for everyone, including German pilsners, IPAs, lagers, porters, stouts, red ales, Belgian super saisons and more. And if making beer wasn't enough... they offer signature pizzas with daily homemade dough that Jesse himself created. Now that the weather is warming up, it's never been better to visit Ten Mile Brewing to enjoy a pint and slice!

DOG LICENSE RENEWAL

Dog licenses are required to be renewed each year. To purchase a dog license from the Parks, Recreation and Library Services Department, please present a current rabies inoculation certificate (must be good for the entire licensing period). For all new dog licenses, a certificate of sterility if the dog has been spayed or neutered must be shown.

The City of Signal Hill contracts with the City of Long Beach Animal Care for services. All dogs, age four months and older, are required to have a current dog license (SHMC 6.08.010).



Dog License Costs:

- ◆ \$95 Unaltered
- ◆ \$20 Altered
- ◆ \$10 Altered – (Seniors Age 60+) – good for one dog per household
- ◆ \$30 Late Fee
- ◆ \$10 Dog License Tag/Replacement Tags

CITY ENCOURAGES PICKING UP AFTER YOUR PET

The City of Signal Hill is encouraging residents to take the lead and scoop the poop! Did you know that dog waste does not break down and can end up in the City's drainage systems? Or that dog waste contains disease causing bacteria and parasite that may be harmful to humans and other pets? Help keep your pets safe and our City clean by picking up after your pet.



SENIOR FOOD DISTRIBUTION PROGRAM

The Senior Food Distribution Program provides low-income Signal Hill residents age 55 years and older with supplemental groceries once a month. Groceries consist of a healthy variety of meat, fresh fruit, vegetables, and canned goods. Applications are available with the Parks, Recreation, and Library Services Department.
